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About this Document

This document provides basic information about editing content in sites using the Wisconsin Agency Site Templates in SharePoint 2013. This document is intended for content authors and approvers, and does not describe all SharePoint 2013 functions.

Wisconsin Agencies Templates: An Overview

In 2014, the Wisconsin.Gov Revitalization Project produced a redesigned and re-architected Wisconsin State portal. As an output of that project, NIC Wisconsin produced two templates for Agency sites. Any Wisconsin state agency can implement one of the two templates at no cost to the agency.

Like Wisconsin.Gov, these templates feature a responsive design delivered using SharePoint 2013 as the web content management platform. These templates provide base functionality which allows agency content managers to build and manage page content containing text, images, and links, and to add web parts.

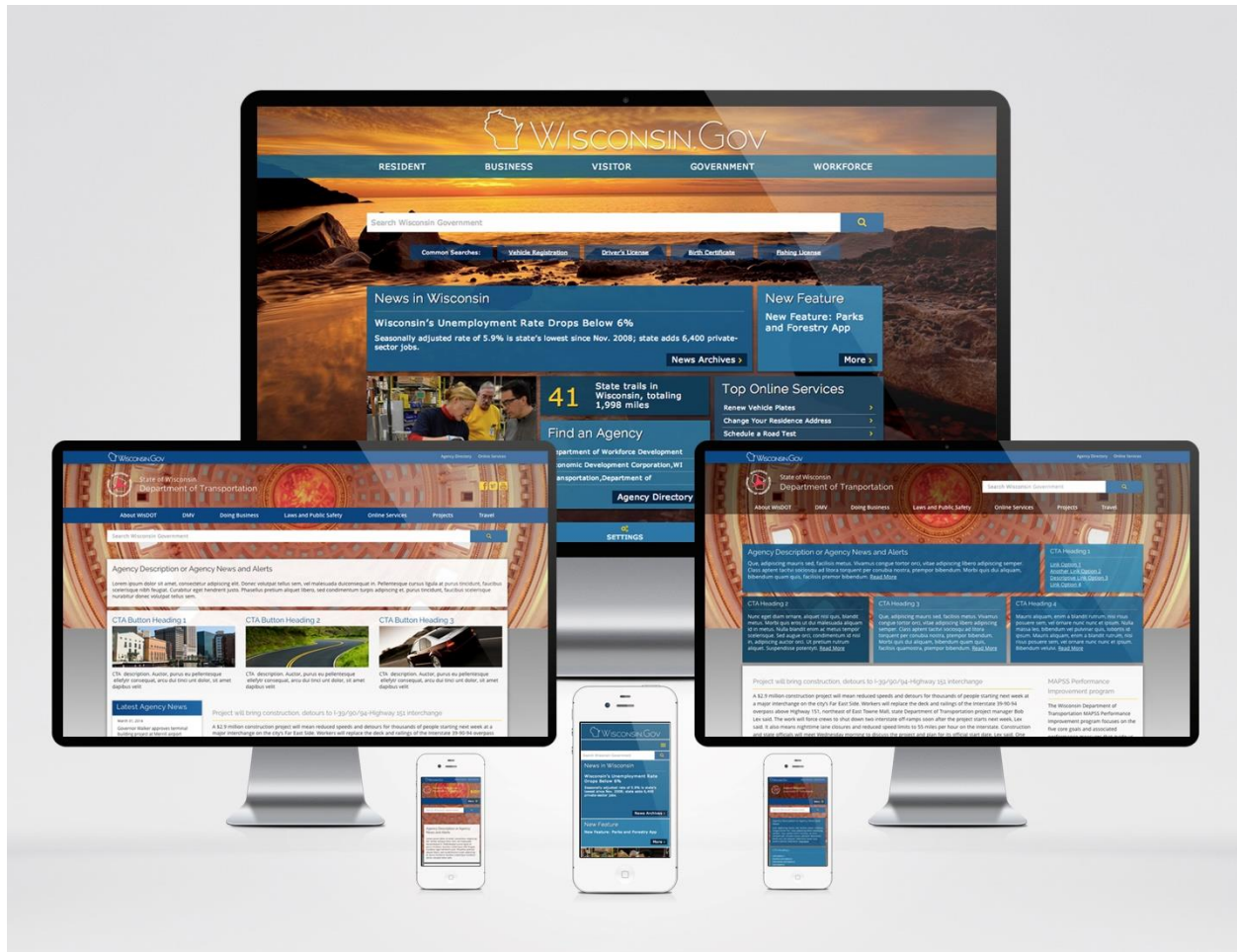


Figure 1: Responsive design on a variety of devices

The templates provide configuration options for the agency as follows:

- Background image
- Agency logo
- Fly-out navigation (three levels)
- Footer links

These configuration options are managed and maintained by NIC Wisconsin on behalf of the agency.



Governance Note: Check with your Agency web content management team to determine your Agency's process for identifying and requesting changes to any of the configuration options.

In addition to the home page layout, each agency template includes three page layouts any of which can be selected for each page on the site. The page layouts include content areas which can be managed and maintained by content editors.

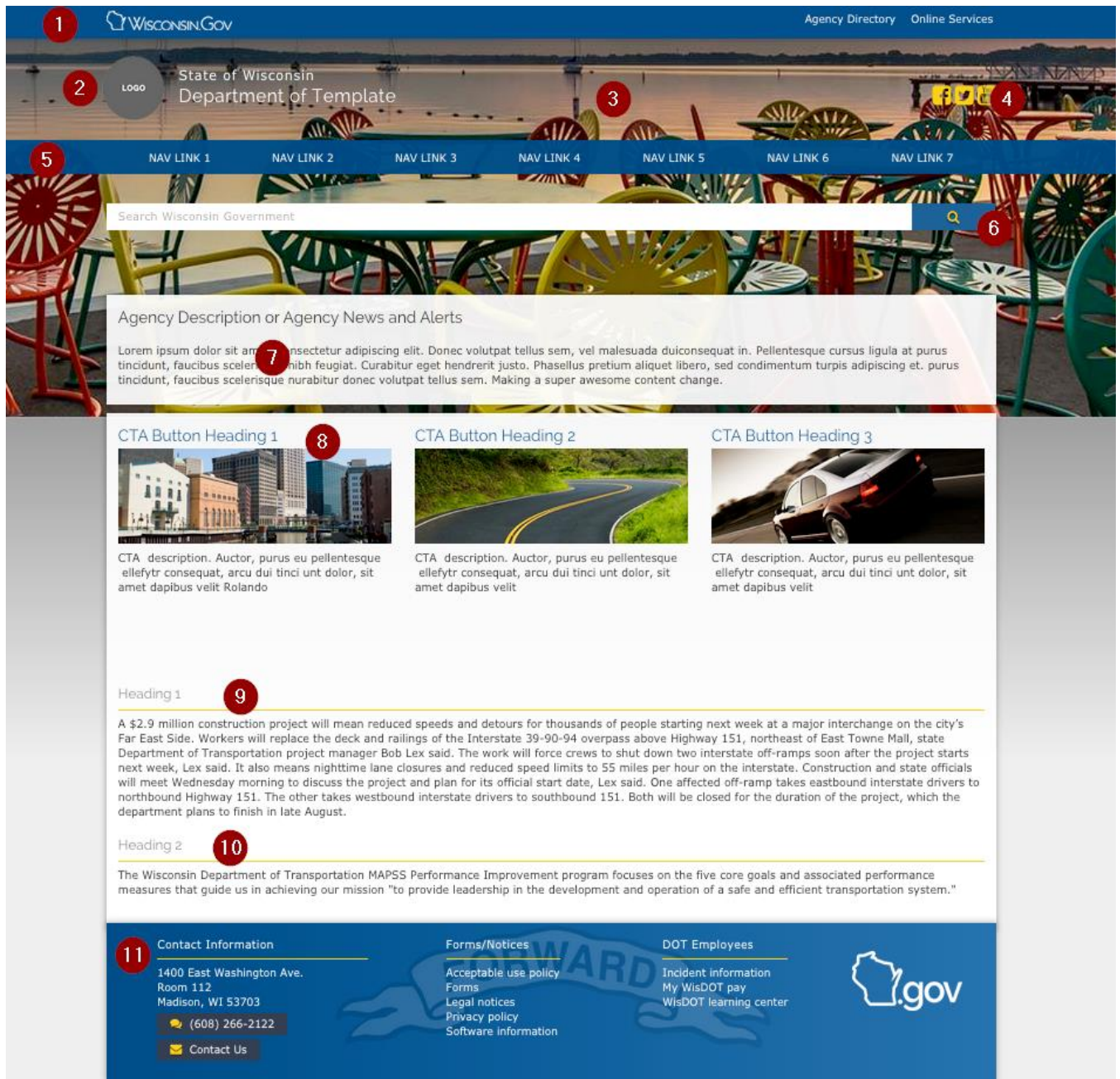
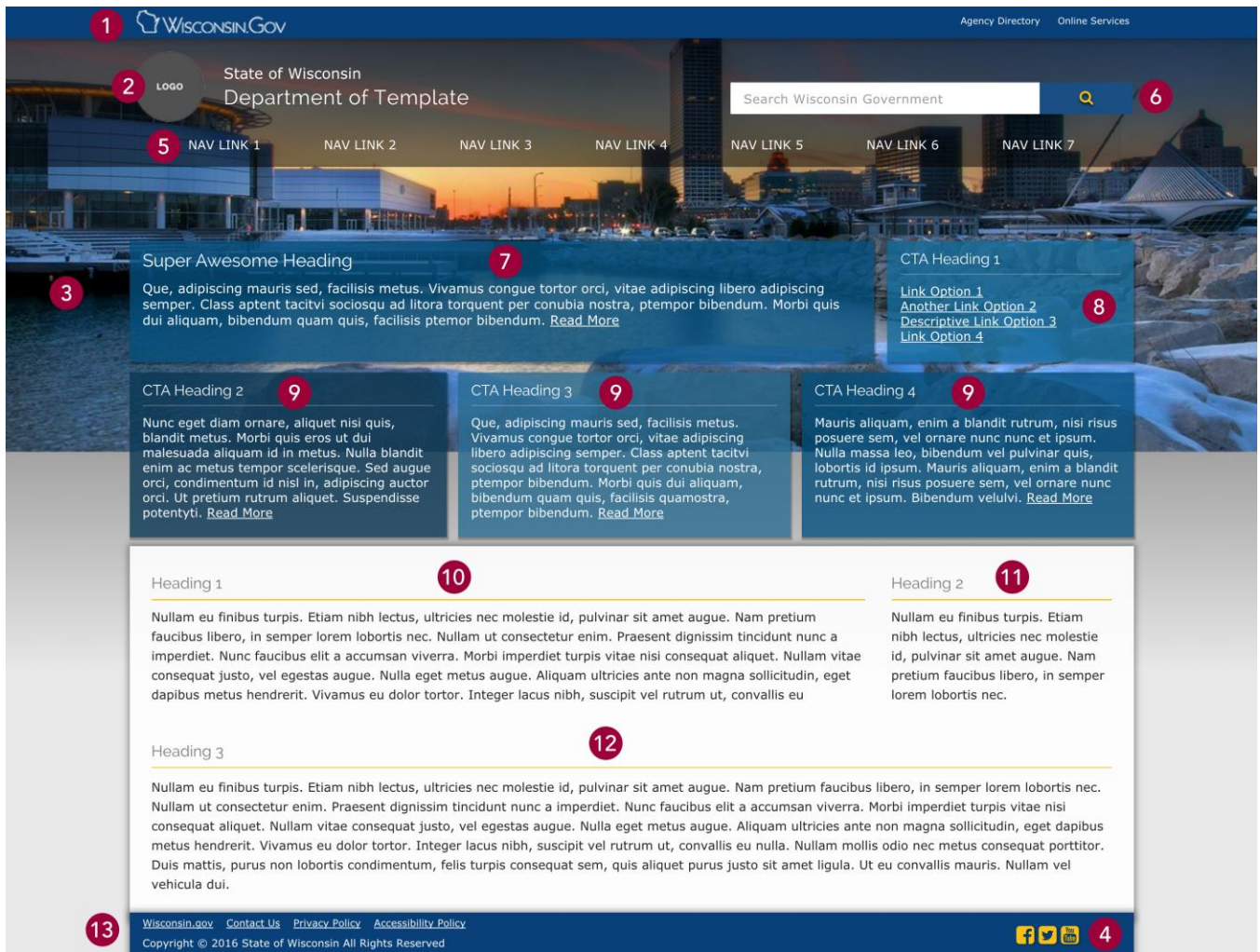


Figure 2: Simple Design Homepage – Annotated

A Word about Variances

Not all agency content can be accommodated by the no-cost agency templates. Therefore, each agency will maintain a list of “variances”, describing content which will not be contained in the templates and defining what will be done with that content in the context of the template projects. Examples of variances may include:

- Large numbers of document and other files
- Interactive images (e.g. images with “hot spots” which animate or link to other content)
- Surveys
- Large tables

Your Agency’s project manager will provide information about reporting and managing variances.

SharePoint for Wisconsin Agencies

Site Navigation

The site template provides top “fly out” navigation which appears across the top of each page on the agency site. This top navigation includes seven top-level categories, which include two nested sub levels (“Secondary” and “Tertiary” navigation), for a total of three levels of top navigation. Each navigation label may be up to 30 characters and spaces in length. Your agency will adjust the site map to fit this format. The flyout navigation is hard-coded and maintained by NIC Wisconsin; your agency will determine the process to add or change fly out navigation.

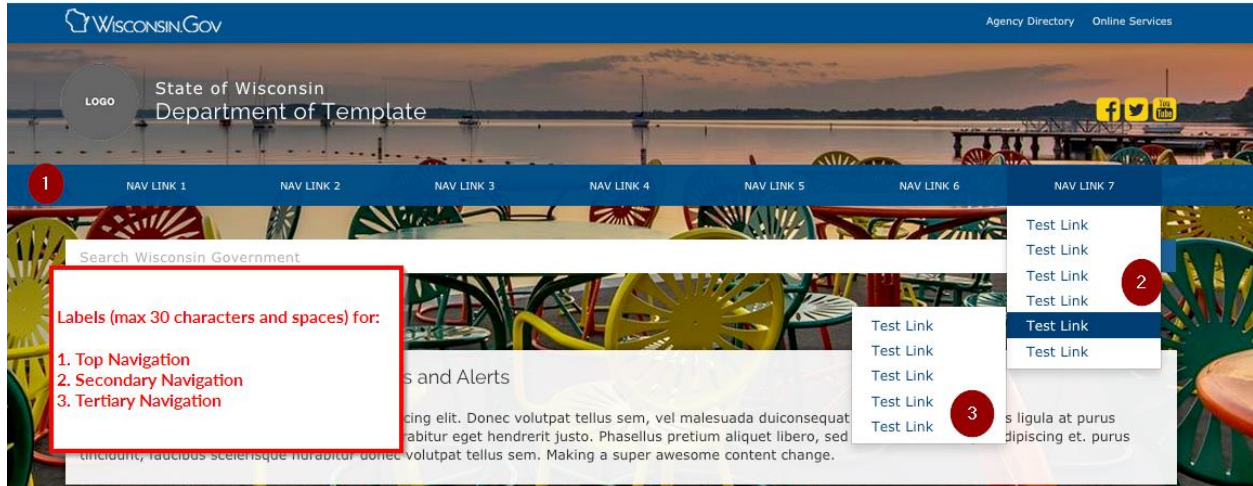


Figure 3: Flyout Navigation - Example (2 levels)

If a page requires levels of navigation that exceeds the three levels provided by the fly-out navigation, you have the option to add links to pages within the content of a page. Links can be added into the content area, or in the right, or left column based on the page layout.




Governance Note: Your Agency web content management team will determine how to identify, approve and request changes to the top three levels of navigation, and will establish how to add and manage additional levels of navigation in the content areas of pages.

SharePoint Ribbon Bar

If you're familiar with Microsoft Office 2007 or later, you've seen the Microsoft Ribbon Bar. The Ribbon is also present in SharePoint. This is where you will be doing most of your page-level editing. From the Ribbon, you can modify page settings, edit and insert content, add web parts, and save or publish your work. You can also access SharePoint's administrative tools via the Site Actions menu, located on the left of the Ribbon bar. User specific options are located under the User menu, located on the far right of the Ribbon bar.

 **Tip:** Sometimes the Ribbon bar tabs do not show by default. To make the Ribbon bar tabs visible, select **Show Ribbon** from the Site Actions menu.

Primary Ribbon Bar Functions

- **Settings (aka “Gear”):** Allows you to view and manage site content, create new pages and sub sites, and administrate site settings.

- **Edit Page icon:** Checks the file out to your account as well as activates the Edit command. Note: This icon changes to a “Save” (disk/arrow) icon when a page is in edit state.

- **Browse tab:** Shows the normal view of the page

- **Page tab:** Provides access to functions to edit page content and properties, as well as check page in and out, and save changes

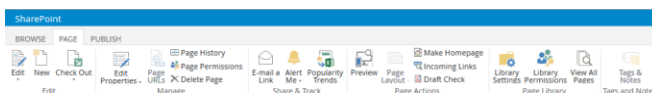


Figure 8: Page tab

- **Publish tab:** Contains functions pertaining to the submitting/approving/publishing workflow

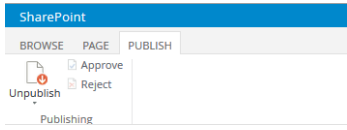


Figure 9: Publish tab

- **User Menu:** Contains items pertaining to the user's account. Most notably, this menu includes the log out option

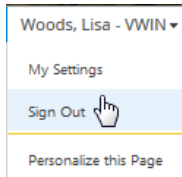


Figure 10: User menu

Getting Started

Log into SharePoint

You will need your Accounts domain ID (email ID) and password, and Internet Explorer 10 or above.

Navigate the Pages Library

Pages on the site are stored in the Pages library. To create a page, or to edit an existing page, first navigate to the pages library.

1. Sign in to your account.
2. Select the Gear icon (Settings) at the upper right and select Site Contents.
3. The page will refresh and the Site Contents page will be displayed. Select the Pages library icon (blue file). The contents of the Pages library will be displayed as a list.



Tip: Selecting the label (and not the icon) for an item in the Site Contents view will display information about that item, rather than opening the item.

Add a Page

Navigate to the pages library.

1. Navigate to the folder in which you want to add the page
2. Select the down arrow on the New document icon in the ribbon and select Page. The Create Page page is displayed.
3. Enter a title for the page with no spaces between words and tab to the Description field. The Title you entered will be automatically populated to the URL name field.
4. Select Create. You will be returned to the pages library and your new page will appear with a green checkmark icon indicating it is checked out to you.



Your Agency web content manager will establish the structure for organizing pages on your site.



Tip: The file will only be visible to the person who created it and until the first time it is checked in.

Check Out Feature

In order to work on a file, it must first be checked out. This ensures that no one else is working on the same file at the same time you are in order to avoid conflicting updates.

To check out a file, sign in to your account.

1. Access the Pages library and locate the file you want to check out.
2. Select the name of the page you want to edit. The page is displayed and you'll see the Ribbon bar at the top of the page. Select the **Page** tab from the Ribbon bar.

3. The option to check out the file is now visible on the Ribbon bar on the left. Select the **Check Out** button to check the file out to your user account.



Tip: The file will remain checked out to you until you check it in, or discard the checkout. No one else can edit a page which is checked out to another person.

Edit Mode

1. After checking out the page, you can then enter Edit Mode by selecting the **Edit** icon under the **Page** tab.
2. Once you enter Edit mode, you will see page content areas outlined and have access to page editing tools. After entering Edit mode, the **Edit** button will change into a **Save** icon.

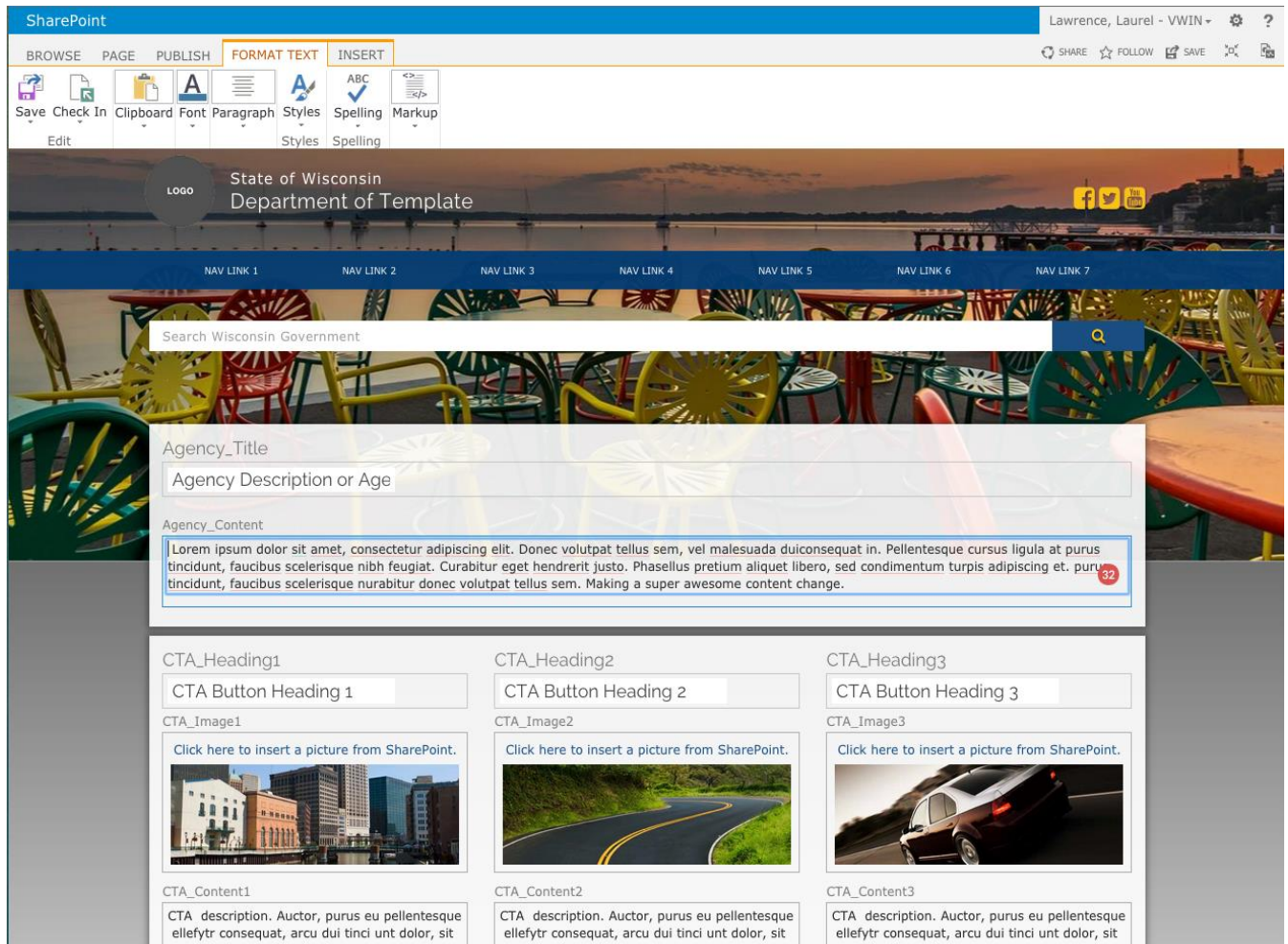


Figure 11: Page in Edit mode with Save button visible

Edit a Page Title

The page title is the text that shows in top of the tab or browser window, identifying the page to the user.

1. To edit a page title, select **Edit Properties** from the Page tab.
2. In the Edit Properties screen, edit the **Title** field and select **Save** at the bottom of the page.

Tip: Do not edit the Name field. This will change the file name of the web page itself and can break the navigation.

Add Content

To add content (text, images, links, etc.) to your page, select the **Page tab**, then select **Edit**. The content areas are outlined and the ribbon provides access to editing tools. A standard Microsoft Word-style text editing menu will appear in a tab called **Format Text** in the Ribbon bar.

Clean Up Text with Notepad

When you create content in them, Microsoft (and other word-processing applications) insert hidden formatting code which can affect the way that content is displayed and behaves in SharePoint. To avoid these problems, you should paste copy from other applications into Notepad before pasting it into SharePoint. Notepad strips out the hidden code so you're pasting "clean text" into SharePoint.

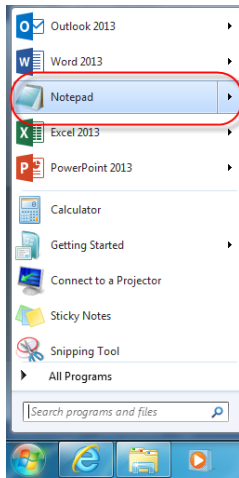


Figure 13: Access Notepad

Add Text Copy

1. Start typing in a content area, or paste your text from Notepad into a content area using the



Tip: You can copy text between Word and Notepad, and between Notepad and SharePoint, using Control+X for Cut, Control+C for Copy, and Control+V for Paste.

Paste function in the ribbon bar.

2. Format the copy using the Styles in the ribbon as specified in Appendix A.

Format Copy

You can format copy in SharePoint just as you would in Word, but with limitations. Below are a few



Tip: We've provided a Style Guide in Appendix A for you to reference when formatting text.

examples of common text formatting tasks in SharePoint.

Format a Headline

Select the text that is to be the headline. From the Markup Styles menu, choose **Heading 1**. The selected text becomes larger and bold.

Format a Bulleted List

Paste or type the text you want to turn into a bulleted list, using the return key to create breaks between bulleted items.

Select the entire list. Select the bullet list item under Format Text in the Ribbon bar.

Insert an Image

1. Place your cursor where you would like to insert an image. From the **Editing Tools** menu, select **Insert**. The Insert selection menu will appear on the Ribbon bar. You can insert a table, picture, link to another website, or document from this menu.

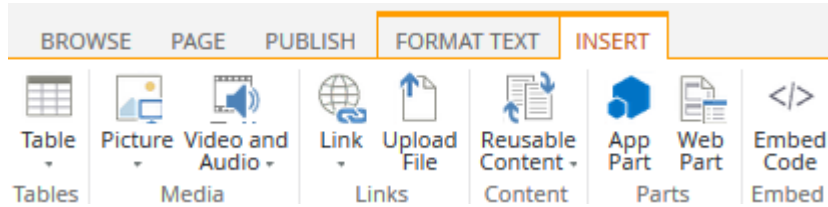


Figure 14: Insert selection menu

2. Select the arrow under the **Picture** icon, and then choose **From Computer**. The **Upload Image** window will appear. This will allow you to upload an image from your local computer to SharePoint.

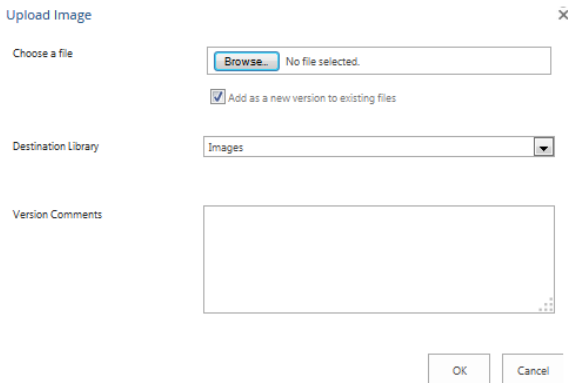


Figure 15: Upload Image window

3. Use the **Choose File** button to navigate your computer and select the image you wish to use. Change the dropdown to Images. When you are finished, select **OK**. Another screen will open, which will allow you to add a title, keyword, and other information. All data is optional in this **metadata properties screen** except the filename, which is pre-filled.

Tip: It's not a good practice to add a picture from an Address unless you have control over the website you are linking from. If the site owners move the image, your link will be

Embed a Video

1. Access the video on Youtube, e.g. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=yyC7Ut3pU6I>
2. Select Embed in the ribbon bar.

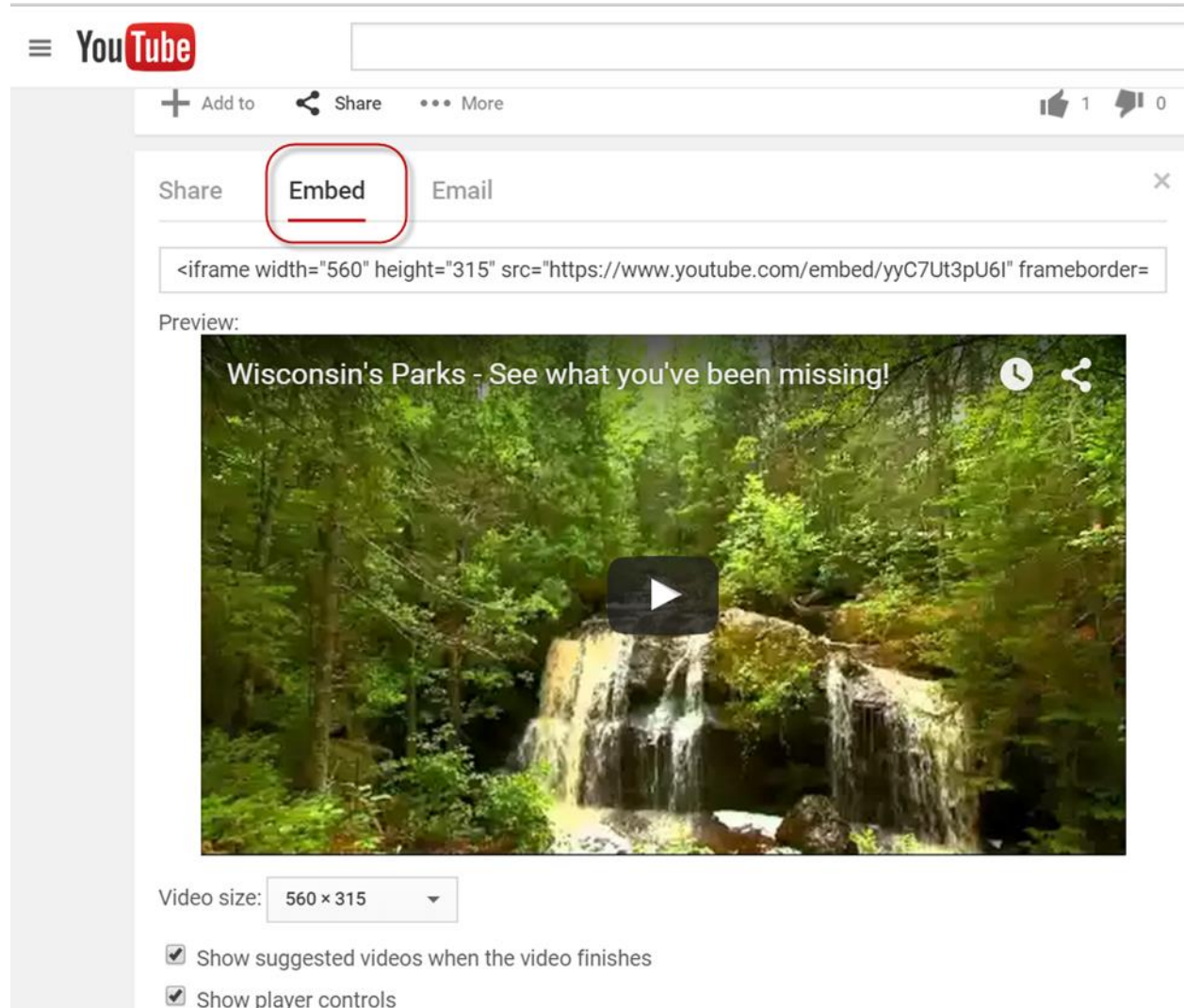


Figure 17: YouTube Share Embed tab

3. Select Options.
4. Copy the URL
5. Access converter to generate valid XHTML, e.g. https://www.tools4noobs.com/online_tools/youtube_xhtml/
6. Generate the code.
7. Strip out the unneeded code. Retain <object> code.
8. Copy the code, e.g.

9. Open the page where you want to add the embedded video.
10. Choose **Insert** from the Toolbar, then choose **Embed Code**.
11. Paste in the code. The window will refresh and display a preview of the video.

Embed a Google Map

1. Locate the address in Google.
2. Select the Menu => Share or embed map

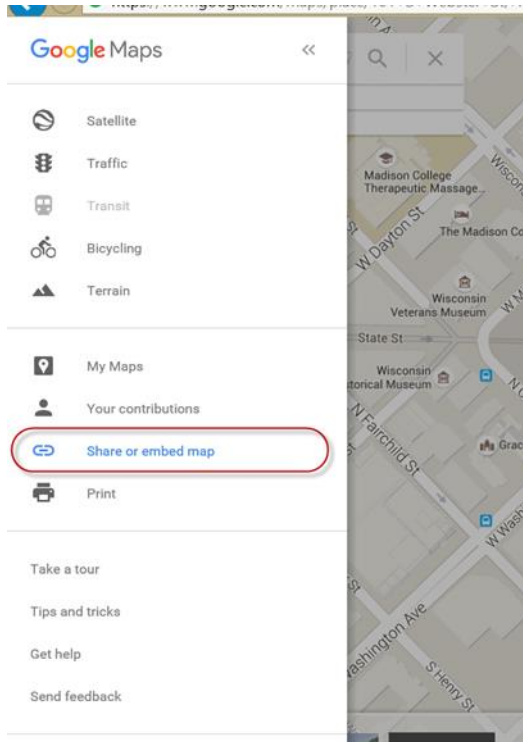


Figure 18: Menu - Share or embed map

3. Select the Embed Map tab; copy the URL.

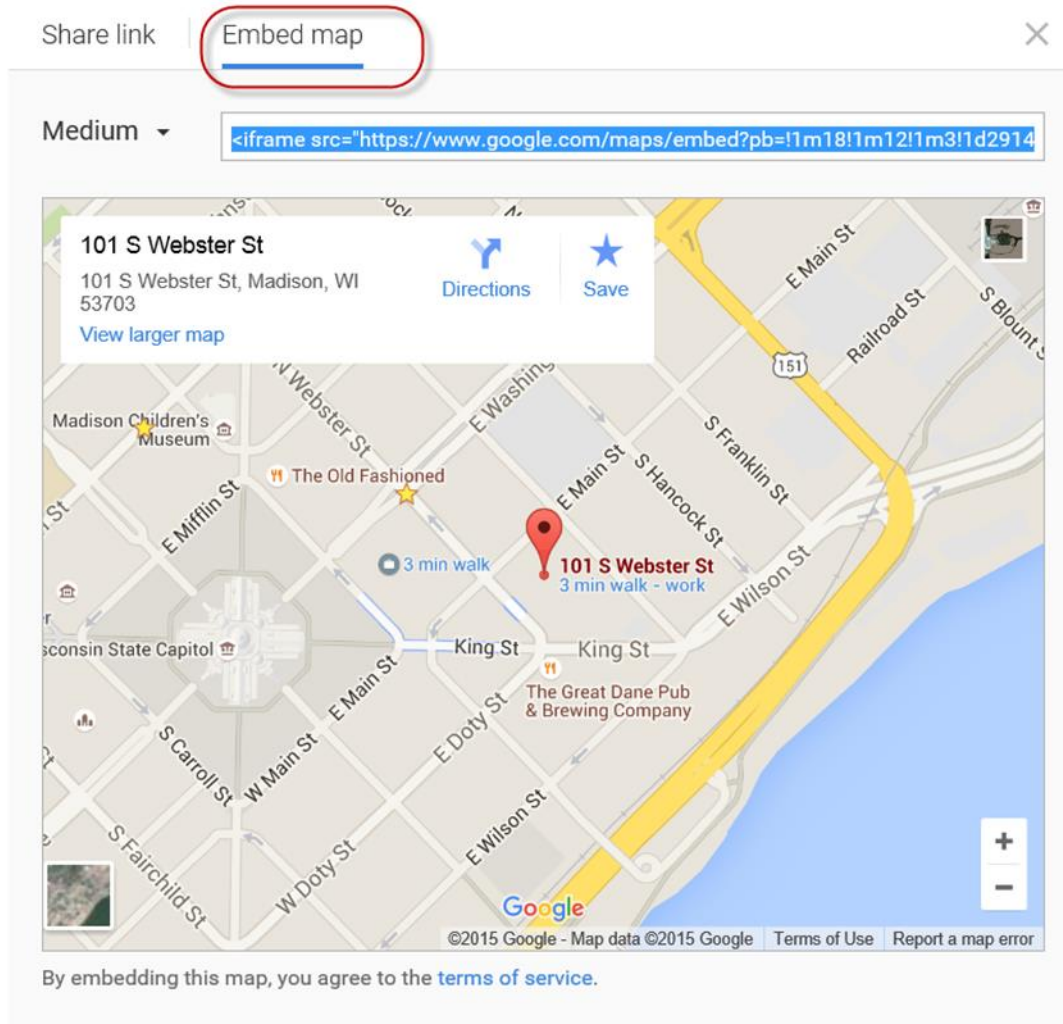


Figure 19: Embed map tab and URL

4. Open the page where you want to add the embedded map.
5. **Insert => Web Part => Script Editor**
6. **Edit Snippet**
7. Paste the URL; a preview of the map will appear below the text field.

Link to a SharePoint Page or Item

1. Place the cursor on the page where you want the link to appear.
2. Then, from the Ribbon bar, select **Insert** under **Editing Tools**. Select the **From SharePoint** option in the dropdown menu under the Link button. A popup window titled **Select an Asset** will appear where you can navigate to the item you want to link to.

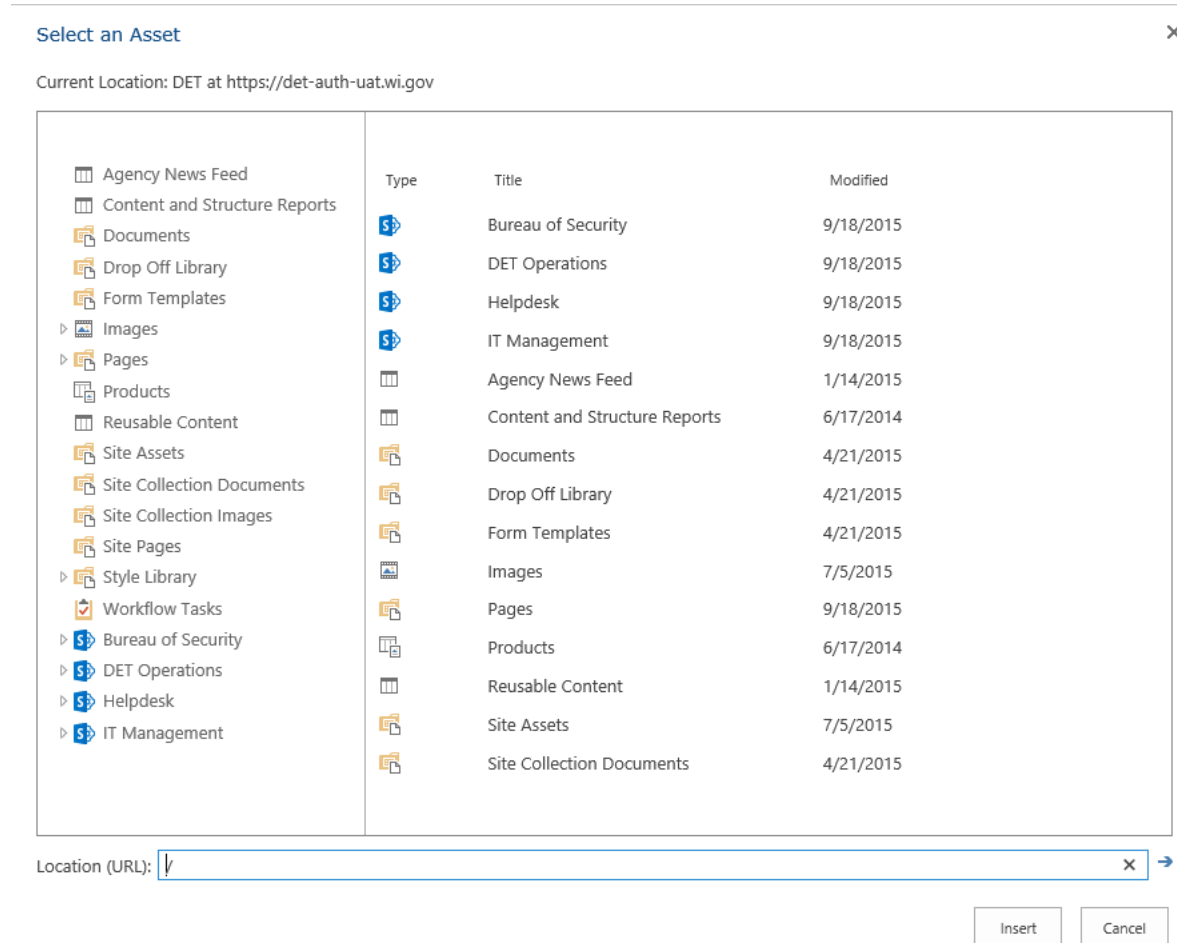



Figure 20 Select an Asset window

Link to an External Website Page or Document

Important Note: If you are linking to an item in SharePoint, do not use this method of linking; use the “Link to a SharePoint Page or Item” steps.

3. Place the cursor on the page where you want the link to appear.
4. Then, from the Ribbon bar, select **Insert** under **Editing Tools**. Select the **From Address** option in the dropdown menu under the Link button. A popup window titled **Insert Hyperlink** will appear where you can enter the label text and the full URL of the page or document you are linking to.

5. Type your link the label text (e.g., “Search Google”) in the **Text to Display** field and type the URL of the site in the **Address** field.



Tip: Don't forget the `http://` in front of the URL (`http://www.google.com`).

6. Select **OK** to continue.

Edit Links

Edit a Link Destination

After creating a link, you can update the destination without starting over.

1. Place the cursor somewhere in the link; do **not** select the entire link. The **Link** menu will appear on the Ribbon bar.

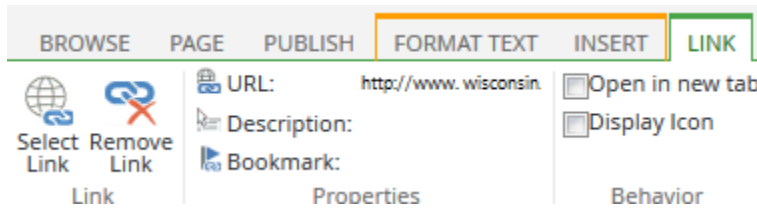


Figure 22: Link menu

2. Update the URL by updating the link in the URL field. Text in the Description field will create the title tag, which is visible when a user hovers their mouse over the link and is used by some accessibility tools.

Edit a Link Label

Edit a link label the same way you would edit normal text on the page.



Tip: If you are replacing an entire link label with a new word, sentence, or phrase, do not select the entire current label and start typing over it as you may lose the link. Leave at least one letter of the old link present until you've typed or pasted the new label, then go back and remove the remaining letter. This keeps the link intact.

Add a Document

Adding a document to your page is very much like adding an image.

1. Place your cursor where you would like to insert the document. From the **Editing Tools** menu, select **Insert**. The Insert selection menu will appear on the Ribbon bar.
2. Select Upload File. The Add a document window will appear.

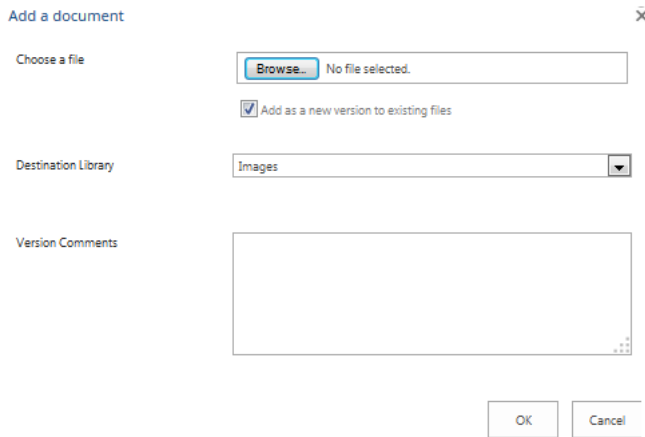


Figure 23: Add a document window

3. Use the **Browser** button to navigate your computer and select the document you wish to use.
4. Change the Destination Library dropdown to **Documents**.
5. When you are finished, select **OK**. Another screen will open where you can enter a title for the document or change the filename.
6. When you are finished, select **Save**.

Upload a batch of Documents to a SharePoint Document Library

1. Access the library location where you wish to upload the files (library or folder within a library).

2. Click the Library tab in the ribbon and select “Open with Explorer”.

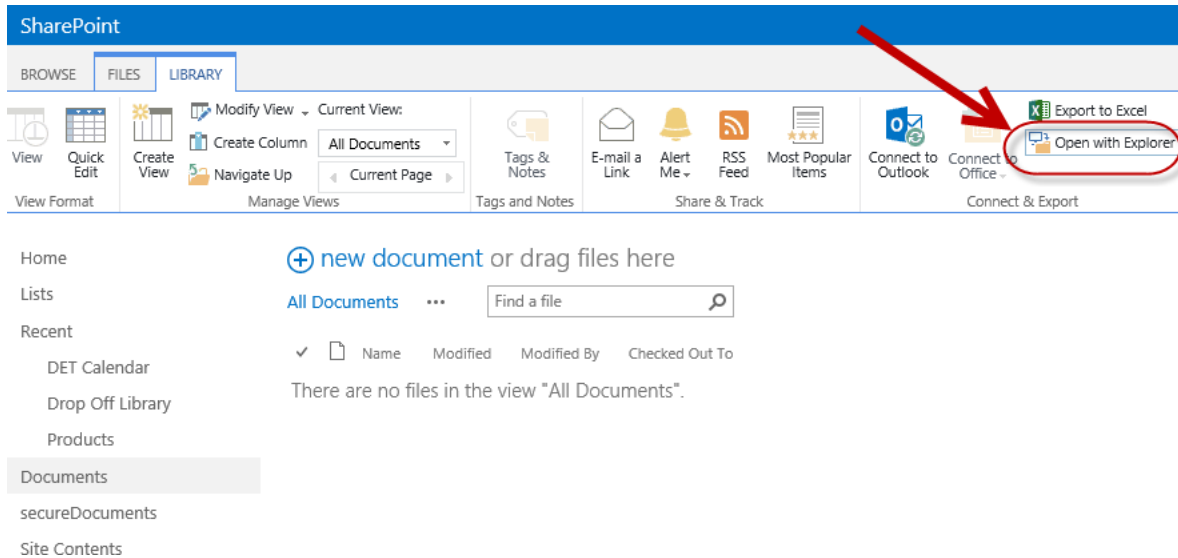


Figure 24: Library tab: Open with Explorer

3. If prompted, re-enter your credentials. After a pause, you will be presented with an Explorer window.

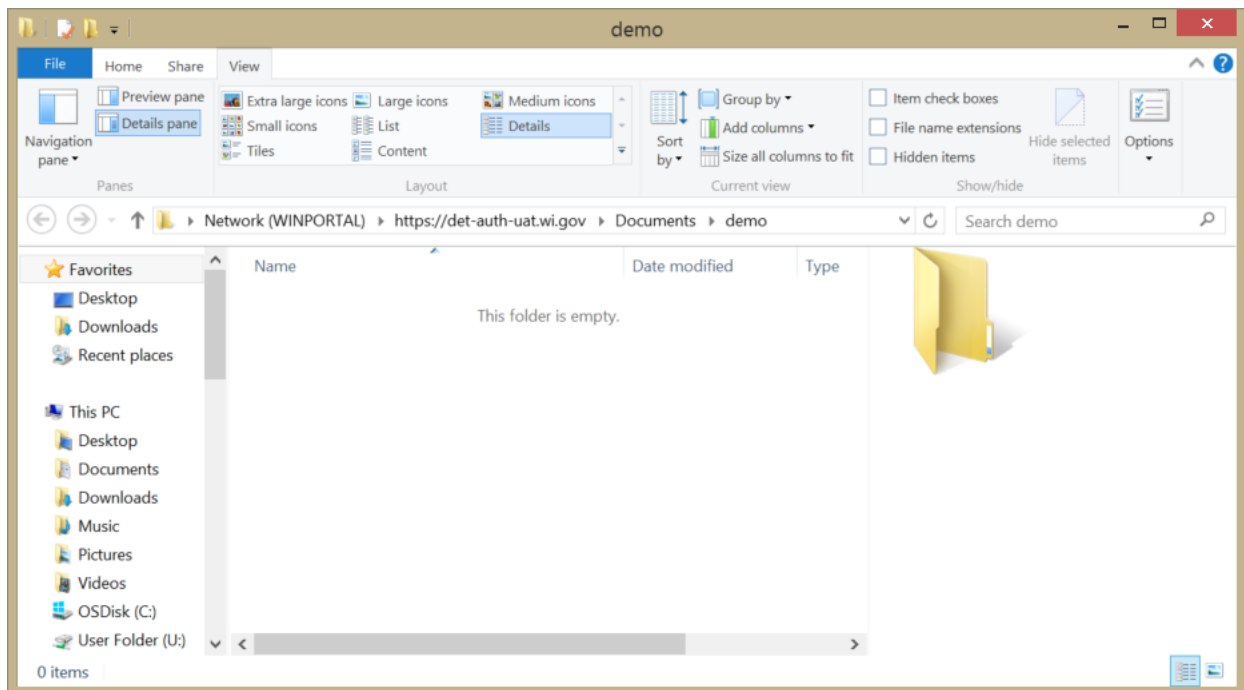


Figure 25: Explorer window with SharePoint path

4. In a separate window, open an Explorer window for the current location of the files you wish to upload.

5. Select the files you wish to upload, and drag them onto the SharePoint Explorer window; the pointer will read “Copy to <location>”.

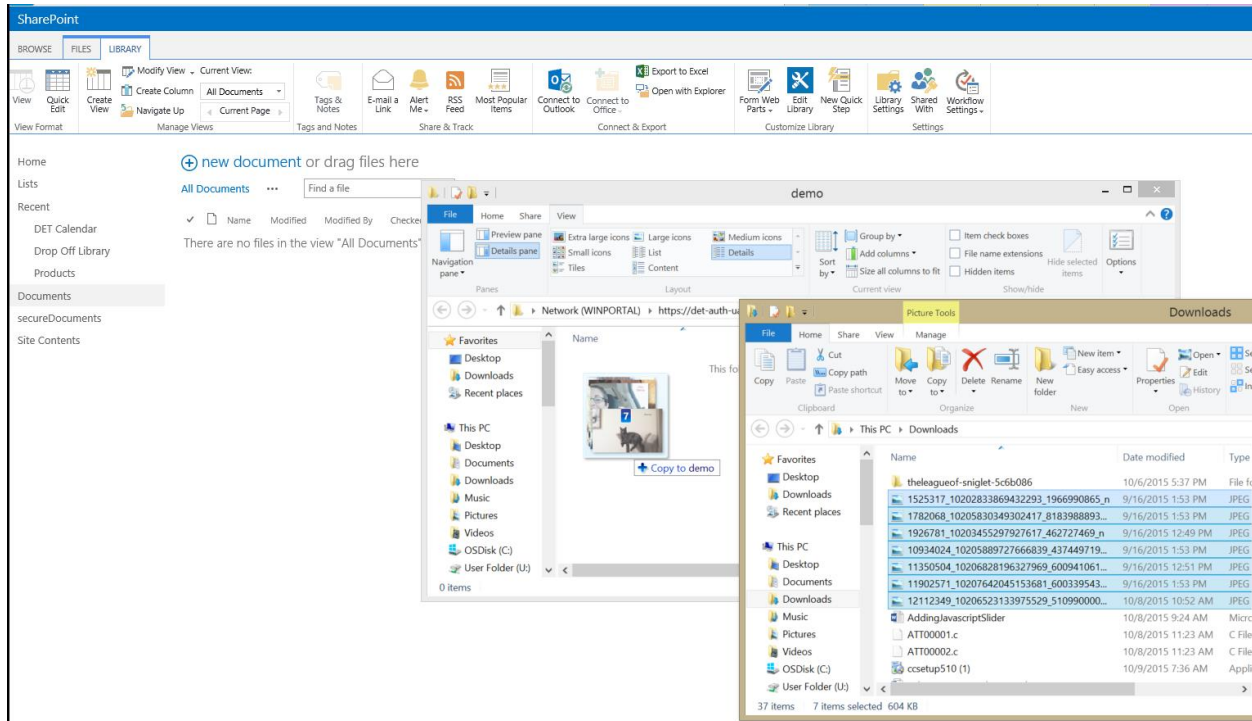


Figure 26: Explorer windows with "Copy to <destination>"

6. Release the left mouse button to “drop” the files on the destination Explorer window.
7. After a pause, the SharePoint Explorer window will refresh to indicate the files have been added to SharePoint.
8. Repeat if you have more files to move.
9. Click the “X” in the upper right to close the Explorer window.
10. Press F5 to refresh the SharePoint library; the files will now appear in the SharePoint location.



Check with your Agency web content management team for your Agency’s policy about storing documents in SharePoint.

Page Layouts

The page layout controls the look and layout of the content inside of a page. There are three page layouts preferred for the Agency Templates:

- **Left Sidebar** – Creates a flexible-width content area on the right and a fixed width, 200px column on the left.
- **Full Width** – Spans the full width of the content area.
- **Right Sidebar** – Creates a flexible width content area on the left, and a fixed width, 200px column on the right.

Page layouts, unlike master pages, can be changed on a page-by-page basis.

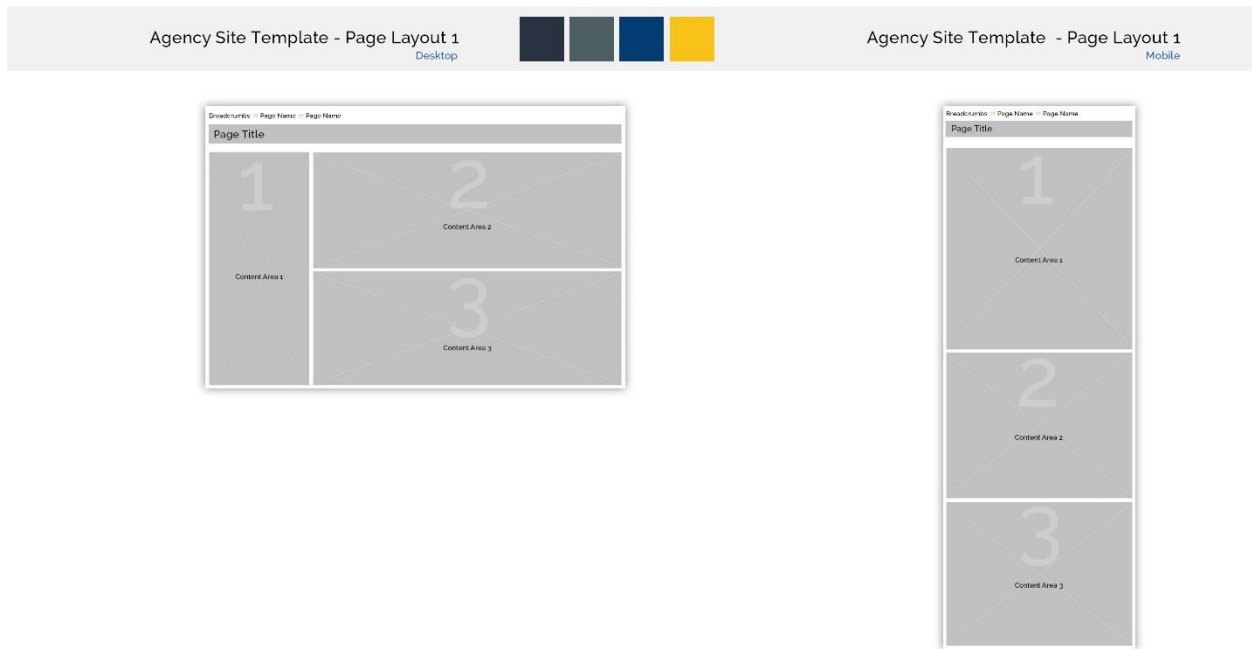


Figure 27: Page Layout 1 - Left Sidebar

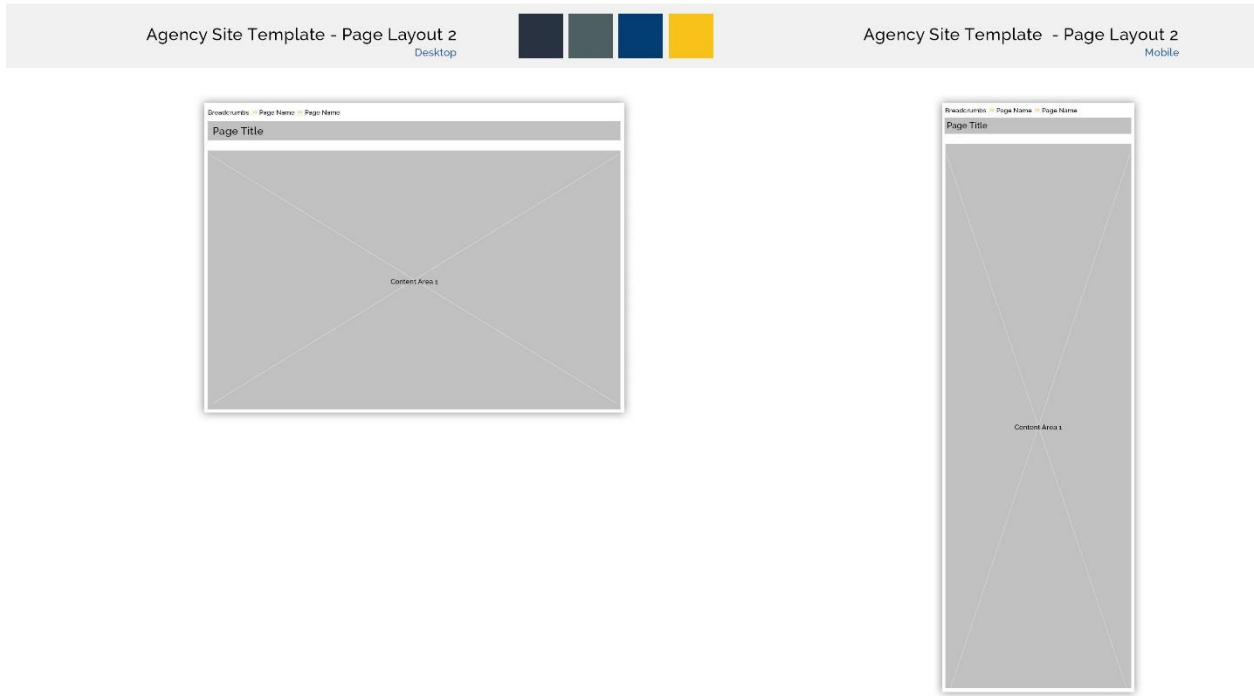


Figure 28: Page Layout 1 - Full Width

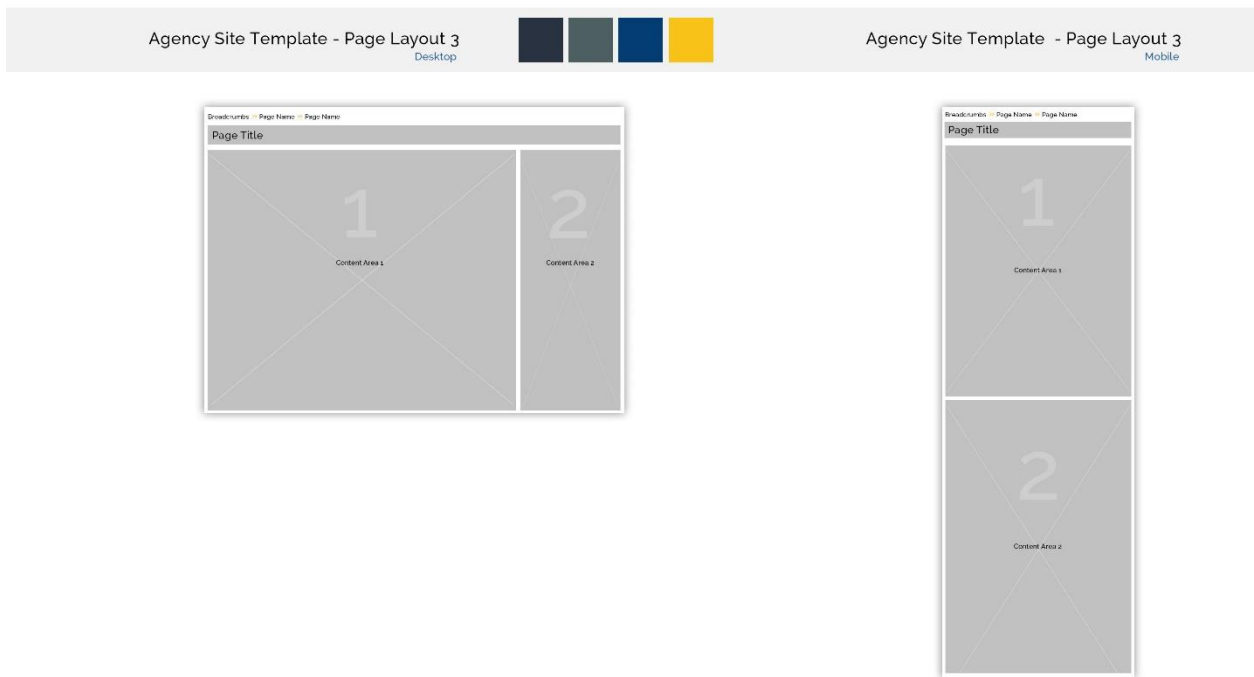


Figure 29: Page Layout 1 - Right Sidebar

Change a Page Layout

To change the page layout of a page, navigate to the desired page and enter Edit mode. Select the page layout you would like to use from the Page Layout menu on the Page tab. You can then add or edit content, check in, and publish as described in earlier steps.

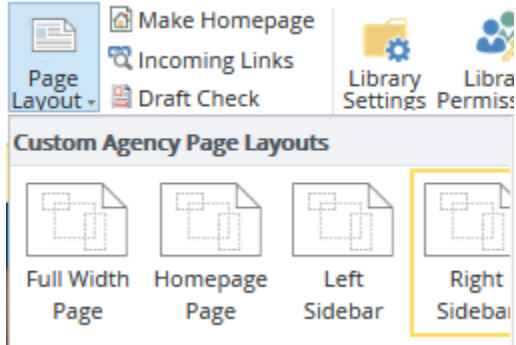



Figure 30: Selecting a page layout in the ribbon

Check In Feature

When you have finished editing the page, you will need to check it back in to allow others to view your changes or work on the page. Checking in a page does not automatically publish it.

1. To check in, select the Page tab in the Ribbon bar, and select the **Check In** button. A comments box will appear where you can write a description of your edits (optional).

Tip: Disregard all changes you made to the page using **Discard Check Out** in the dropdown menu under the Check In button. This will revert the page to its last check in state, regardless of any saved changes you may have made since then.

2. Select the **Continue** button to finish the check in process.

Save Your Work

You can also save your work without checking the document back in. This will allow you to close your browser window and return later to continue editing. Your changes will only be viewable by you, however, until the file is checked in.

1. To save your work, select the **Save** button from the Pages tab. This will save your work and exit edit mode.

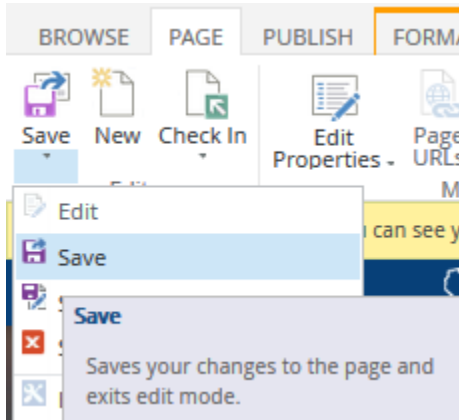


Figure 32: Save button on Pages tab



Tip: You can also save without closing by selecting **Save and Keep Editing** from the dropdown menu under the **Save & Close** button. You can reach the dropdown menu by selecting the down arrow under the **Save & Close** button.

Publishing

Submit for Approval

After your changes are checked in and ready to be made visible for all visitors to your site, you need to publish your changes. Depending on your role, you will have different functions during the publishing process. You will either be a submitter or an approver.

1. To submit a page for publication, select the **Publish** tab in the Ribbon bar and select **Submit**.

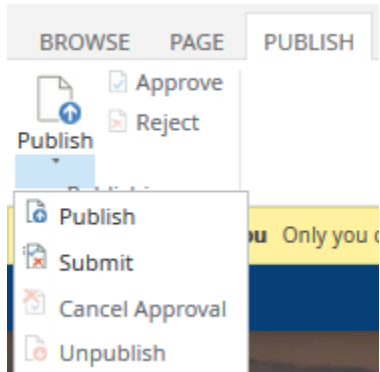


Figure 33: Publish tab and Submit button

The Submit for Approval window will be displayed.

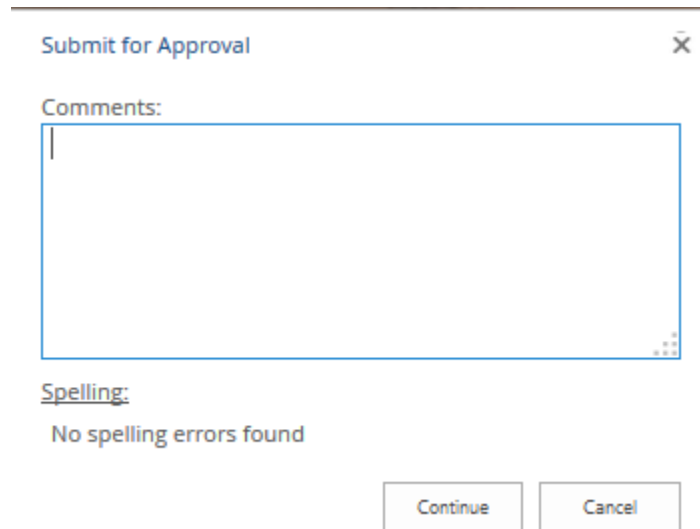


Figure 34: Submit for approval window

2. Select the **Continue** button to begin the publishing workflow. Users with approval permissions will then be able to view the page, and approve or reject it. If the page is approved, it will be immediately viewable to all visitors to your website. If rejected, the page will be available to content editors to make changes.



Tip: You can choose to undo your submission by selecting the Cancel Approval button that takes the place of the Submit button once you have selected Submit.

Approve or Reject

There are two ways approvers can approve or reject changes. The first is to go to the page that has been edited and needs approval directly. From there, choose the **Publish** tab. Then, choose either **Approve** or **Reject**.

Approvers may also use the list view provided by the **Approve/Reject Items view** in the Pages library:

1. From **Site Actions**, go to **Site Content**. Choose **Pages**. You will be presented with a list of all pages in the site, along with their approval status and some other information.
2. Select **Approve/reject items** option at the top of the page.

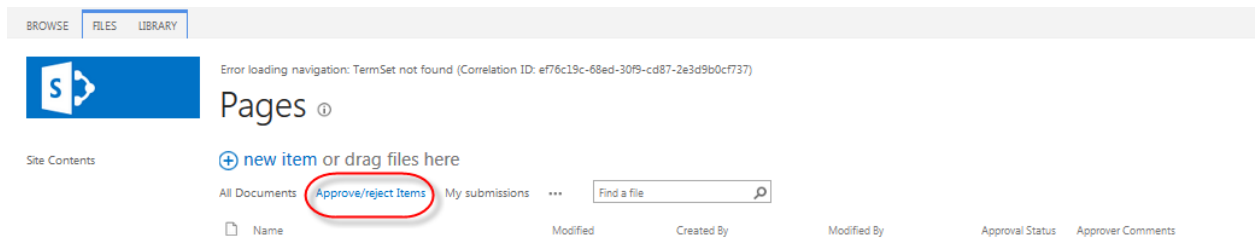


Figure 35: Approve/reject Items option

3. Items submitted for approval appear in the Approval Status: Pending area of the list view.

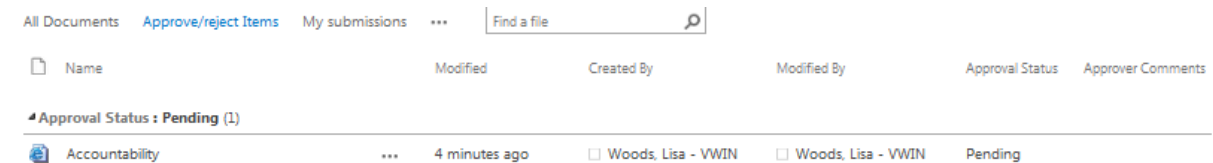


Figure 36: Approval Status: Pending area

4. Select a page to approve or reject.
5. Review the page and then select the Publish tab.
6. Select **Approve** or **Reject** and complete the comments field. Approved items will become public at the next publishing window. Rejected items will not be published and may be edited and re-submitted for approval by the contributor. Comments will appear in the Approve/reject items view.

Delete a Page

If you are certain you no longer need a page on your site, you can delete it.

1. Navigate to the page you want to remove.
2. Under the Page tab, select **Delete Page**. You will be asked to confirm.
3. Select **OK** to delete the page.

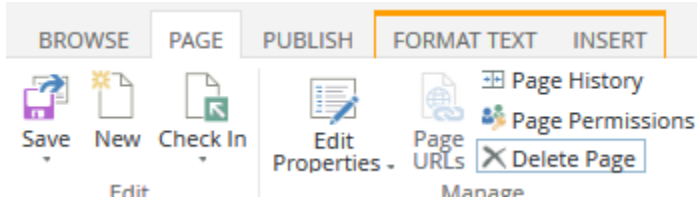


Figure 40: Delete Page on Page tab

You will be redirected to the site home page.

Appendix A: Agency Template Style Guide

This style guide has been provided as a visual reference to styles available to content creators in SharePoint's content editing interface. 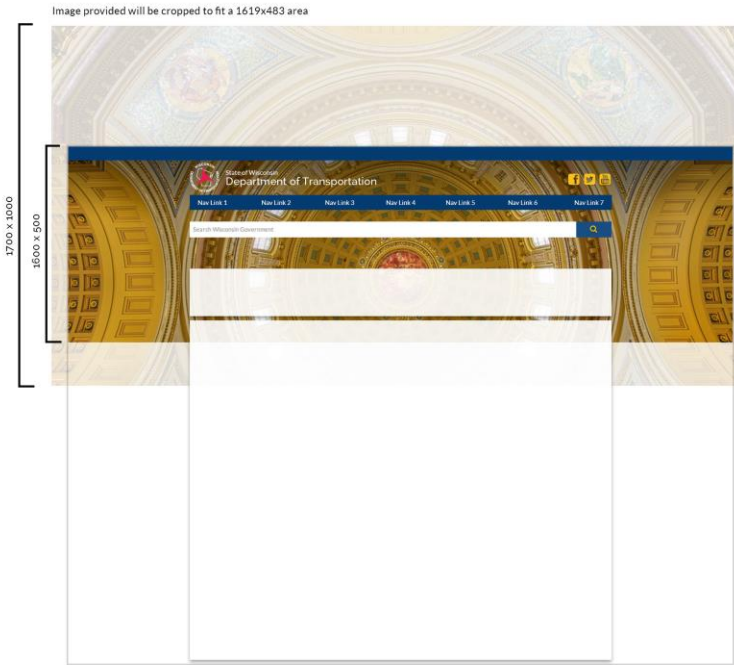

Appendix C: Website Usability Guidelines

These guidelines will help you understand the basic usability principles you can employ on your site to provide your users with the best experience possible. Usability encompasses accessibility, but it's much more than that. Usability also involves making sure your website is easy for visitors to use by offering standard, consistent navigation across all site pages, organizing content in an easy to follow manner, using headline tags for scanability, and more (*Source: www.useeffect.com, User Effect, Dr. Peter J. Meyers*).

Accessibility

This section addresses traditional accessibility issues as well as issues that might prevent a visitor from being able to access information on your website. If a user can't get your site to load, or the content is too small to read, all of the usability best practices in the world won't matter.

1. **Site Load-time is Reasonable** – Call me old-school, but I still like to see sites come in under 100KB (60KB is even better). If a site takes forever to load, most people will just leave. Yes, many of us have broadband now, but that makes our patience even thinner.
2. **Adequate Text-to-Background Contrast** – Dark-gray on light-gray may seem stylish, but I'm not going to ruin my eyesight to read your blog. Eyes and monitors vary wildly, so keep your core copy contrast high. Good, old-fashioned black-on-white is still best most of the time.
3. **Font Size/Spacing Is Easy to Read** – Opinions vary on the ideal size for text, but err on the side of slightly too big. Poor readability increases frustration, and frustration leads to site abandonment. Also, make sure your line spacing is adequate - white-space is a designer's best friend.
4. **Flash & Add-ons Are Used Sparingly** – No matter how great your site looks, people won't wait 5 minutes for a plug-in to load. Use new technology sparingly and only when it really enhances your goals. Sticking to standard HTML/CSS is also a plus for search engines.
5. **Images Have Appropriate ALT Tags** – Not only do sight-impaired visitors use ALT tags, but search engines need them to understand your images. This is especially critical when you use images for key content, such as menu items.
6. **"Website Not Found"** is a good way to lose a customer. Create a custom 404 page, preferably one that guides your visitors to content.

Identity

A key question when someone first comes to your site is "Who are you?" It's important to answer it quickly, and make the paths to obvious follow-up questions ("What do you do?", "Why should I trust you?," etc.) clear.

7. **Company Logo Is Prominently Placed** – Put your logo or brand where it's easy to find, and that usually means the upper-left of the screen. People expect it, and they like it when you make their lives easy.
8. **Tagline Makes Company's Purpose Clear** – Answer "What do you do?" concisely with a descriptive tagline. Avoid marketing jargon and boil your unique value proposition down to a few words. This

is also a plus for SEO.

9. **Home-page Is Digestible In 5 Seconds** – In usability, we often talk about the 5-second rule. There's some disagreement over just how many seconds you get, but website visitors are a fickle bunch, and they need to get the basic gist of your home-page in just a few moments.
10. **Clear Path to Company Information** – The good old "About Us" page may seem boring, but confidence is important on the web, and people need an easy way to learn more about you.
11. **Clear Path to Contact Information** – Similarly, visitors want to know that they can get in touch with you if they need to. It's also hard to do business if no one can contact you. Preferably, list your contact information as text (not in an image) - it'll get picked up by search engines, including local searches.

Navigation

Once people generally know who you are and what you do, they need clear paths to the content that interests them. Information architecture is a huge topic, but these points cover some of the basics.

12. **Main Navigation is Easily Identifiable** – Almost every site on the web has had a main menu since the first browsers came on the market. Make your main navigation easy to find, read, and use. If you have two or more navigation areas, make it clear why they're different.
13. **Navigation Labels are Clear & Concise** – Don't say "Communicate Online With Our Team" when "Contact Us" will do just fine. Your main navigation should be short, to the point, and easy for mere mortals to grasp.
14. **Number of Buttons/Links is Reasonable** – Psychologists like to argue about how many pieces of information we can process, but if you start to get past 7-or-so menu items, think hard about whether you need them. If you've got 3 layers of flyaway Javascript menus, do yourself a favor and start over.
15. **Company Logo is Linked to Home-page** – This may sound minor, but people expect logos to link to home-pages, and when they don't, confusion follows. I've seen video of users selecting a logo over and over, with no idea what to do next.
16. **Links are Consistent and Easy to Identify** – The underlined, blue link is a staple of the web. A little artistic license is ok, but consider at least making your links either blue or underlined. Links should stand out, and you should use them sparingly enough that they don't disrupt your content.
17. **Site Search is Easy to Access** – If you have a site search, make sure it's prominent. Usability guidelines tend to prefer the upper-right corner of the page. Keep the button simple and clear - "Search" still works best for most sites.

Content

You've heard it before – Content is king. If you don't want the kingdom to crumble, though, content needs to be consistent, organized, and easy to skim through.

18. **Major Headings are Clear and Descriptive** – Most people don't read online, they skim. Use headings (major and minor) to set content apart and keep it organized. Headings should be clear, and for SEO benefit, using heading tags (<H1>, <H2>, etc.).
19. **Critical Content is Above the Fold** – The "fold" is that imaginary line where the bottom of your

screen cuts off a page. Content can fall below the fold, but anything critical to understanding who you are or what you do (especially on the home-page) should fit on that first screen. Average screen resolution these days is about 1024x768, depending on your audience.

20. **Styles and Colors are Consistent** – Make sure people know they're still on your site by being consistent - confuse them and you'll lose them. Layout, headings, and styles should be consistent site-wide, and colors should usually have the same meaning. Don't use red headers on one page, red links on another, and red text somewhere else.
21. **Emphasis (bold, etc.) is Used Sparingly** – It's a fact of human cognition: try to draw attention to everything and you'll effectively draw attention to nothing. We've all seen that site, the one with a red, blinking, underlined "NEW!" next to everything. Don't be that guy.
22. **Ads and Pop-ups are Unobtrusive** – Ads are a fact of life, but integrate them nicely into your site. Don't try to force ads and pop-ups down peoples' throats. Also, do people a favor and make your ads clear. If you blur the line between ads and content too much, your content may suffer.
23. **Main Copy is Concise and Explanatory** – This isn't a lesson in copywriting, but look at your home-page - can you say the same thing in half as many words? Try to be concrete and descriptive and avoid jargon - nobody cares if you can "leverage your synergies".
24. **URLs are Meaningful and User-friendly** – This is a point of some debate, but meaningful keyword-based URLs are generally good for both visitors and search engines. You don't have to re-engineer an entire site just to get new URLs, but do what you can to make them descriptive and friendly.
25. **HTML Page Titles are Explanatory** – More importantly, your page titles (in the <TITLE> tag) should be descriptive, unique, and not jammed full of keywords. Page titles are the first thing search-engine visitors see, and if those titles don't make sense or look like spam, they'll move on to the next result.

- Web page appears significantly messed up, or you are editing the wrong page? Discard check out.

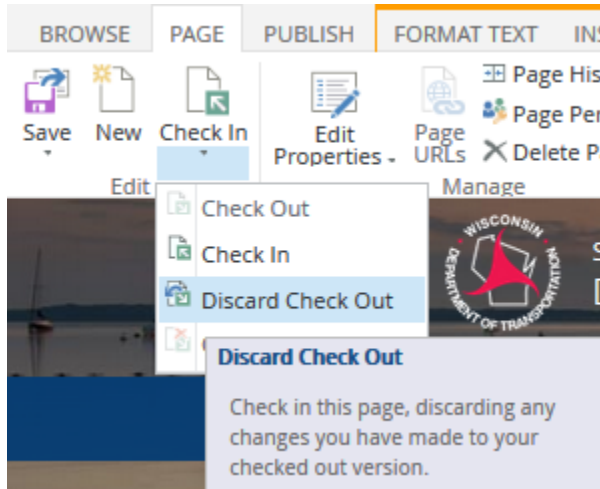


Figure 41: Discard Check Out in the Page ribbon tab

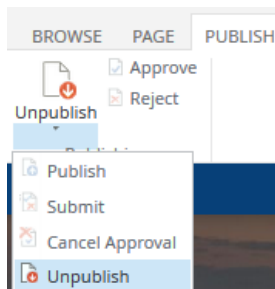


Figure 43: Unpublish page function in Publish ribbon tab
